Continuity Clinic

- Clinic continues throughout all rotations
- Residents are assigned a continuity panel of patients that steadily grows throughout residency training
 - PGY1 ~100 patients; PGY2 ~200 patients; PGY3 ~300 patients

 On service months (IM, OB, Peds), clinic schedules are reduced by 1 half day per week; PGY2 residents on night float have clinic 1 half day on Friday am only

PGY-1 Curriculum

- Year 1 is all required rotations
- Rotations include:
 - ► FM Intro (First block, 4 weeks)
 - Adult inpatient med x2 (8 weeks total)
 - Obstetrics x2 (8 weeks total)
 - Pediatric x2 (8 weeks total)
 - Emergency Med (6 weeks total)
 - Cardiology (4 weeks)
 - Ortho (4 weeks)
 - Surgery (4 weeks)
 - Community medicine (4 weeks)
 - Other core rotation (2 weeks)



PGY-2 Curriculum

Year 2 is mostly required rotations, with some electives

■ Rotations include:

- Adult inpatient medicine on nights x2 (8 weeks total)
- Obstetrics x2 (8 weeks total)
- Pediatric x2 (8 weeks total)
- Gynecology (4 weeks)
- Sports medicine (4 weeks)
- Psychiatry (4 weeks)
- Geriatrics (4 weeks)
- Urology (2 weeks)
- Ophthalmology (2 weeks)
- Elective rotations 8 weeks





PGY-3 Curriculum

Year 3 has the most elective rotations.

Rotations include:

- Adult inpatient medicine x2 (8 weeks total)
- Chief resident (6-8 weeks total)
- Pediatric Emergency Med (4 weeks)
- Practice management (4 weeks)
- Neurology (2 weeks)
- ► ENT (2 weeks)
- Geriatrics (2 weeks)
- Dermatology (2 weeks)
- **■** Elective rotations 20-22 weeks

Adult Medicine

Our Family Medicine service is located at Midtown Hospital

■ Team: at least one PGY1 and at least one PGY3 on day shift, one PGY2 on night shift in house

Attendings: inpatient faculty rotate on a weekly basis



- Average census of our service is between 8-12 patients
- Additional inpatient encounters with the hospitalist- especially on nights for admission experience!



Pediatrics

- Located at Gateway Hospital
- Team: at least one PGY1 and at least one PGY2 on day shift
 - 2nd and 3rd years rotate nightly on OB/Peds call
 - Attending's: one of the 2 Pediatric hospitalists and Dr. Wetstein



- Average census varies by season, between 8-10 patients is typical
- Residents on Pediatrics also cover the pediatric acute clinic in the afternoon

Obstetrics/Newborn

- Located at the Women's Hospital
- Team: at least one PGY1 and at least one PGY2 on day shift
 - 2nd and 3rd years rotate nightly on OB/Peds call



- Attendings:
- 3 community FM physicians also assist in covering the service
- Surgical backup and some primary coverage provided by the local OB group

Obstetrics/Newborn

- ~250-280 deliveries (vaginal and C/S) per year from DFMR and ECHO clinic patients
- Additional deliveries with the local OB group available
- Routine inpatient newborn care for patients following with DFMR or ECHO clinic
- ► ECHO Clinic:
 - FQHC serving our area
 - Drs. Phifer, Quartey, and Wetstein cover the OB/GYN clinic
 - Residents gain experience in routine OB care, GYN care, and GYN procedures
 - Primary language of active ECHO OB patients: 44% Spanish, 15% Haitian Creole (and growing), 3% other



Call Responsibilities

- ► PGY1- no overnight call ©
 - 1 weekend day call per week while on service
 - 2 holiday daytime calls
 - Occasional 1 weekend day while off service
- PGY2- majority of call
 - Q4 home call on OB/Peds blocks
 - 1-2 home calls for OB/Peds while offservice
 - Average over 1 year of 1 overnight home call shift every 9 days
 - 2 holiday 24 hour home calls

■ PGY3

- Weekend home call for DFMR inpatient service twice during each IM block and Chief block
- 1-2 home calls for OB/Peds during offservice blocks
- Average over 1 year of 1 overnight home call shift every 14 days

- Pays \$125/hour currently
- Outside options exist with PD approval
